3. Treatment

How can we address every population of Garlic Mustard in the area? What are the best candidates for herbicide treatment vs Manual removal?

- Treatment in floodplain
 - No treatment next to river due to erosion risk
 - No herbicide
 - Flooding smothers it
- Prioritize Treatments based on outliers
- Herbicide treatment
 - 3 times a year for success
 - Garlon
 - Selective: leaves sedges and grasses intact
 - Target dense, large sites
 - Target 2^{ed} year and kill off 1st year plants
 - Fire may speed up the seed bank
 - Use on small populations

4. Volunteers

Best method of recruiting; success stories; lessons learned

- Get teachers on board
- Pulls no more than 3 hours long
- Look for specific groups

- Have them volunteer where they care (Adopt a Spot)
- Borrow busses/vans from local schools (partner match)
